Mediterranean Crossroads Graziella Parati, 1999 This book offers samples of the literary and cultural production of an innovative group of new Italian language writers whose autobiographical texts focus on exploring their identities as immigrants in a Western country This anthology contributes to the ongoing discussions on exile diaspora and migration by documenting the unique Italian case **BOOK JACKET** Multicultural Literature in Contemporary Italy Marie Orton, Graziella Parati, 2007 This volume is intended as complementary to *Mediterranean Crossroads Migration Literature in Italy* that traced the changes in literature written by migrants in Italy from 1990 to the end of that decade The short stories and excerpts from novels included in that volume concentrated on very specific themes such as exile displacement cultural fragmentation otherness racism and other concerns that are characteristic of the writings of a first generation migrants The goal of this new collection is to provide both scholars and students of global migrations with further examples of the wealth of literary material created by migrants to Italy These migrants come from a vast number of countries in Africa Asia Eastern Europe South America and the Middle East The authors included here are not intended to reflect demographic percentages but rather a cross section and sampling of the current literary production The texts included in this new volume demonstrate that not only has the number of published texts by migrant writers multiplied in just a few short years but that the level of sophistication in the writings has also markedly increased The topics discussed vary widely from text to text and the most recognizable differences between these texts and those included in *Mediterranean Crossroads* is the widespread use of humor in the newer writings even in discussions of painful situations of isolation and racism Some authors such as Christiana de Caldas Brito Tahar Lamri and Yousef Wakkas were included in *Mediterranean Crossroads* Their works here illustrate the changes in what might have earlier been classified as Italophone literature Other authors in this volume complicate any simplistic notions of what migration literature in Italian is and what Italian literature itself is This directly challenges traditional discourses regarding national literatures and demonstrates that migration literature in Italy is no passing phenomenon it is here to stay Migration literature **The Cambridge Companion to the Italian Novel** Peter Bondanella, Andrea Ciccarelli, 2003-07-31 The *Cambridge Companion to the Italian Novel* provides a broad ranging introduction to the major trends in the development of the Italian novel from its early modern origin to the contemporary era Contributions cover a wide range of topics including the theory of the novel in Italy the historical novel realism modernism postmodernism neorealism and film and the novel The contributors are distinguished scholars from the United Kingdom the United States Italy and Australia Novelists examined include some of the most influential and important of the twentieth century inside and outside Italy Luigi Pirandello Primo Levi Umberto Eco and Italo Calvino This is a unique examination of the Italian Novel and will prove invaluable to students and specialists alike Readers will gain a keen sense of the vitality of the Italian novel throughout its history and a clear picture of the debates and criticism that have surrounded its development

Transcultural Modernities Elisabeth Bekers, Sissy Helff, Daniela Merolla, 2009 The swelling flows of migration from Africa towards Europe have aroused interest not only in the socio political consequences of the migrants insistent appeals to fortress Europe but also in the artistic integration of African migrants into the cultural world of Europe While in recent years the creative output of Africans living in Europe has received attention from the media and in academia little critical consideration has been given to African migrants modes of narration and the manner in which these modes give expression to or are an expression of their creators transcultural realities *Transcultural Modernities Narrating Africa in Europe* responds to this need for reflection by examining the manner in which migrants compose and negotiate their Euro African affiliations in their narratives The book brings together scholars in the fields of literary and art criticism cultural studies and anthropology for an extensive interdisciplinary exchange on the specific modes of narration displayed in Euro African literatures the visual arts and cinema as well as offering ethnographic case studies The result is a wide range of reflections on how African artists writers and ordinary people living in Europe experience and explore their transcultural and or postcolonial environments and how their experiences and explorations in turn contribute to the construction of modern Euro African life worlds

Women and Migration Deborah Willis, Elyn Toscano, Kalia Brooks Nelson, 2019-03-08 The essays in this book chart how women s profound and turbulent experiences of migration have been articulated in writing photography art and film As a whole the volume gives an impression of a wide range of migratory events from women s perspectives covering the Caribbean Diaspora refugees and slavery through the various lenses of politics and war love and family The contributors which include academics and artists offer both personal and critical points of view on the artistic and historical repositories of these experiences Selfies motherhood violence and Hollywood all feature in this substantial treasure trove of women s joy and suffering disaster and delight place memory and identity This collection appeals to artists and scholars of the humanities particularly within the social sciences though there is much to recommend it to creatives seeking inspiration or counsel on the issue of migratory experiences

Cervigni, 2005 *Migrant Imaginaries* Jennifer Burns, 2013 This book addresses a rich corpus of contemporary narratives by authors who have come to Italy as migrants It traces the figurative commonalities that emerge across these diverse texts which together suggest the shape and substance of what might be termed migrant imaginaries Examining five central figures and concepts identity memory home place and space and literature across a range of novels and stories by writers of African and Middle Eastern origin the study elucidates the affective and expressive processes that inflect migrant story telling Drawing on the work of cultural theorists such as Sara Ahmed and Michel de Certeau as well as on recent work in postcolonial literary studies memory studies human geography and feminist theory the book probes the varied works of Shirin Ramzanali Fazel Amara Lakhous Mohsen Melliti Younis Tawfik and many others Each chapter posits alternative interpretations of the ways in which the interior experience of encounters across territories

cultures and languages is figured in this literature In doing so the book moves towards a wider apprehension of recent Italian migration narratives as suggestions of what a new notion of contemporary Italian literature might look like figured at once within and beyond the boundaries of a national literature a national language and a national cultural imaginary Exile Literature Dino S. Cervigni, 2002 *Italian Americana*, 2003 Trends in Contemporary Italian Narrative, 1980-2007 Gillian Ania, Ann Caesar, 2007 The new Italian narrative TM that began to be spoken about in the 1980s was not associated with a single writer or movement but with an eclectic and varied production The eight essays that make up this volume set out to give a flavour of the breadth and range of recent trends and developments The collection opens with two essays on crime fiction In the first Luca Somigli examines novels dealing with topical issues or recent history and which reveal a strong indigenous and regional tradition while in the second Nicoletta McGowan discusses the particular case of a noir by Claudia Salvatori They are followed by essays on two of Italy TM s best known contemporary writers Marina Spunta TM s essay explores the representation of space place and landscape in the work of Gianni Celati and photographer Luigi Ghirri while Darrell O TM Connell analyses the fiction of Vincenzo Consolo and his struggle to find a means of representing an ethical stance within fiction Two essays then examine the role of the anthology for young writers Charlotte Ross and Derek Duncan in the context of lesbian and gay writing looking at identity politics and the problematics of categorization Monica Jansen and Inge Lanslots in that of the oeYoung Cannibals and their often unsettling non literary language and orientation towards cinema pop music and slang The penultimate essay by Jennifer Burns discusses the literature of migrants to Italy focusing on questions of identity memory mobility and language while the final contribution by Gillian Ania is a study of apocalypse and dystopia in contemporary writing looking at novels by Vassalli Capriolo Avoledo and Pispisa This volume examines Italian narrative from the 1980s to the present from the original viewpoint of genres categories trends rather than author based analyses It highlights the innovations of the last twenty years incorporating into the various themes well known writers like Consolo Celati and Vassalli with relative newcomers like Avoledo and Pispisa The contributors to the volume academics from the UK Ireland Canada Belgium cover a wide range of themes which have come to the fore during this period ranging from detective stories both the giallo and the noir to lesbian and gay writing to immigration literature in Italian to the study of apocalypse and dystopia The themes are contextualized in the socio political and cultural changes taking place in Italy and parallel to this the temporal moments of the narratives are in turn related to their historical realities This is a richly woven account which presents post 80s Italian narrative from a new and stimulating angle in eight lucid and informative essays which will be welcomed by all those interested in contemporary fiction in its cultural context Professor Anna Laura Lepschy Department of Italian University College London **AdI**, 1983 **Beginnings, Endings, Beginnings** Dino S. The volume also raises important issues about the transfer of feminist concepts across cultures and languages. And to English speaking audiences the volume will offer different viewpoints on some of the key debates.
