The writer examines a variety of reasons why test performance may not always be a valid measure of a person's competence or potential Citing that a sizable percentage of students perform well in their schoolwork but poorly on standardized multiple choice tests Bond defines and discusses four candidates as source factors for the phenomenon 1 Test Anxiety characterized by anticipatory feelings of dread and nervousness before a test and a disorienting anxiety during the actual test that in extreme forms can literally paralyze the student 2 Lack of Test Sophistication the ability to use characteristics and formats of the test and the test taking situation to obtain a higher score 3 Automaticity the ability to recall quickly relevant facts procedures and routines and to apply these without thinking too much about it and 4 Test Bias the simple fact that standardized tests may contain material that many students have not had an opportunity to learn The lesson concludes the writer is that those who make decisions about people on the basis of standardized test performance must keep an eye out for cases where students who should excel do not so that poor test performance should not trump a person's actual academic or occupational accomplishments
