Personal life He was married to the Irish writer Rosamond Langbridge with whom he had one son Rev Valentine Fletcher who has subsequently held various ministries across Yorkshire including Bradford and Sedbergh Death Fletcher died in 1935 one week short of his 72nd birthday He was survived by his wife Rosamond and son Valentine
