Part Object Part Sculpture Helen Anne Molesworth, 2005 *Part Object Part Sculpture* maps a genealogy of postwar sculpture that challenges the Minimalist Post Minimalist sequence maintained in most accounts of the period *Found Sculpture and Photography from Surrealism to Contemporary Art* Julia Kelly, 2017-07-05 Taking its departure point from the 1933 surrealist photographs of involuntary sculptures by Brassa nd Dal *Found Sculpture and Photography from Surrealism to Contemporary Art* offers fresh perspectives on the sculptural object by relating it to both surrealist concerns with chance and the crucial role of photography in framing the everyday This collection of essays questions the nature of sculptural practice looking to forms of production and reproduction that blur the boundaries between things that are made and things that are found One of the book s central themes is the interplay of presence and absence in sculpture as it is highlighted disrupted or multiplied through photography s indexical nature The essays examine the surrealist three dimensional object its relation to and transformation through photographs as well as the enduring legacies of such concerns for the artwork s materiality and temporality in performance and conceptual practices from the 1960s through the present *Found Sculpture and Photography* sheds new light on the shifts in status of the art object challenging the specificity of visual practices pursuing a radical interrogation of agency in modern and contemporary practices and exploring the boundaries between art and everyday life

Gabriel Orozco Ann Temkin, 2009 From the developer of **Sculpture Undone, 1955-1972** Elena Filipovic, Joanna Mytkowska, Alina Szapocznikow, 2011 A sculptor who began working during the postwar period in a classical figurative style Alina Szapocznikow radically reconceptualized sculpture as an imprint not only of memory but also of her own body Though her career effectively spanned less than two decades cut short by the artist s premature death in 1973 at age 47 Szapocznikow left behind a legacy of provocative objects that evoke Surrealism Nouveau R ealisme and Pop art Her tinted polyester casts of body parts often transformed into everyday objects like lamps or ashtrays her poured polyurethane forms and her elaborately constructed sculptures which at times incorporated photographs clothing or car parts all remain as wonderfully idiosyncratic and culturally resonant today as when they were first made Well known in Poland where her work has been highly influential since early in her career Szapocznikow s compelling book of work is ripe for art historical reexamination Alina Szapocznikow *Sculpture Undone 1955 1972* offers a comprehensive overview of this important artist s work at a moment when international interest is blossoming Spanning one of the most rich and complex periods of the 20th century Szapocznikow s oeuvre responds to many of the ideological and artistic developments of her time through artwork that is at once fragmented and transformative sensual and reflective playfully realized and politically charged Featuring over 100 works including sculpture drawings and photography the exhibition draws on loans from private and public collections including major institutions in Poland It is accompanied by a major publication co published by The Museum of Modern Art and Mercatorfonds that reflects new scholarship on Szapocznikow contextualizing this little known artist s work for a wider

audience Publisher's website **Art Papers Magazine** ,2006 *Cy Twombly's Things* Kate Nesin,2014 Cy Twombly 1928-2011 is widely acknowledged as one of the postwar period's most influential American artists yet his sculptures are little known. From 1946 onward he made hundreds of rarely exhibited found object assemblages often painted or plastered over with diverse coatings of white. Across decades Twombly thus developed a singular strikingly consistent body of work despite the shifting status of sculpture during his lifetime. In this revelatory monograph Kate Nesin first establishes then evaluates the artist's long engagement with the historical and contemporary limits of sculpture both as medium and as word. While others have described Twombly's three-dimensional works as timeless transcendent and poetic Nesin complicates our sense of their so-called poetry focusing on the prosaic conspicuously material operations of these sculptural things and emphasizing the inherent difficulties as well as possibilities of the language used to characterize them. Through close readings of individual works and in-depth analyses of certain guiding concerns such as surface naming gaps and repetitions she illuminates Twombly's remarkable sculptural practice.

Feminisms with Chinese Characteristics Ping Zhu, Hui Faye Xiao, 2021-12-28 The year 1995 when the Fourth World Conference on Women was held in Beijing marks a historical milestone in the development of the Chinese feminist movement. In the decades that followed three distinct trends emerged: first there was a rise in feminist NGOs in mainland China and a surfacing of LGBTQ movements; second social and economic developments nurtured new female agency creating a vibrant women-oriented cultural milieu in China; third in response to ethnocentric Western feminism some Chinese feminist scholars and activists recuperated the legacies of socialist China's state feminism and gender policies in a new millennium. These trends have brought Chinese women unprecedented choices, resources, opportunities, pitfalls, challenges, and even crises. In this timely volume Zhu and Xiao offer an examination of the ways in which Chinese feminist ideas have developed since the mid-1990s. By juxtaposing the plural feminisms with Chinese characteristics they both underline the importance of integrating Chinese culture, history, and tradition in the discussions of Chinese feminisms and stress the difference between the plethora of contemporary Chinese feminisms and the singular state feminism. The twelve chapters in this interdisciplinary collection address the theme of feminisms with Chinese characteristics from different perspectives rendered from lived experiences, historical reflections, theoretical ruminations, and cultural and sociopolitical critiques painting a panoramic picture of Chinese feminisms in the age of globalization.

The Object Antony Hudek, 2014 Discussions of the object as a key to understanding central aspects of modern and contemporary art. Artists increasingly refer to post-object based work while theorists engage with material artifacts in culture. A focus on object-based learning treats objects as vectors for dialogue across disciplines. Virtual imaging enables the object to be abstracted or circumvented while immaterial forms of labor challenge materialist theories. This anthology surveys such reappraisals of what constitutes the objectness of production with art as its focus. Among the topics it examines are the relation of the object to subjectivity, distinctions between objects and things, the significance of the object's transition from inert mass to tool, or
