those who are ruled The outcome is a differentiation of every single concept that must from now bear the adjectives of the necropolitical or forensic therefore we can talk about forensic images art projects and necropolitical life democracy citizenship This will change radically the perspectives of an emancipative project of politics if it is any possible to be named as such for the future
