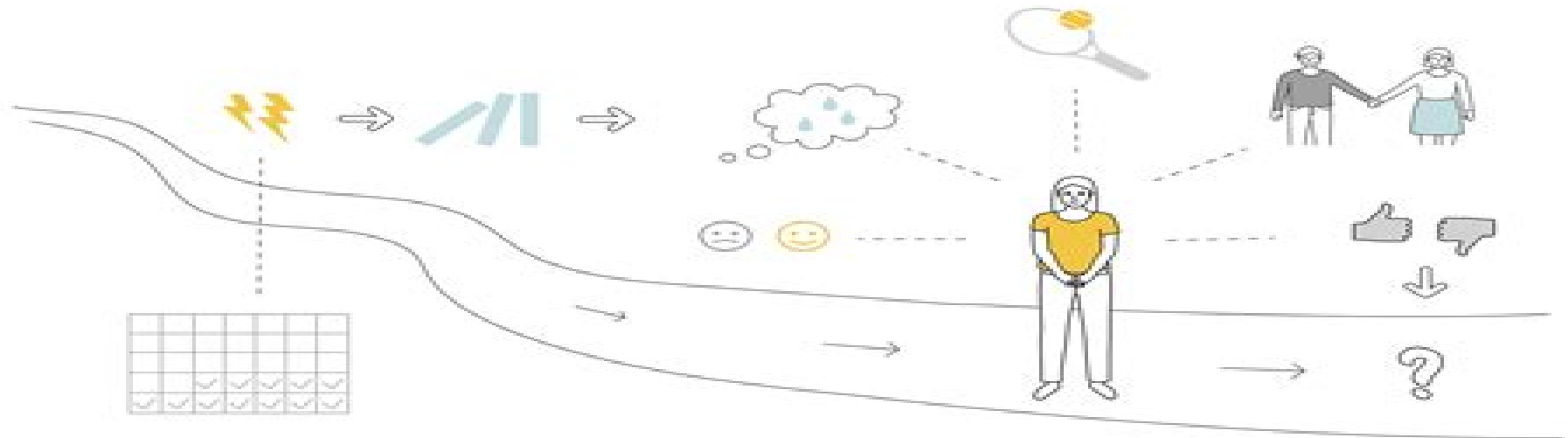




Useful Narrative Therapy Questions
