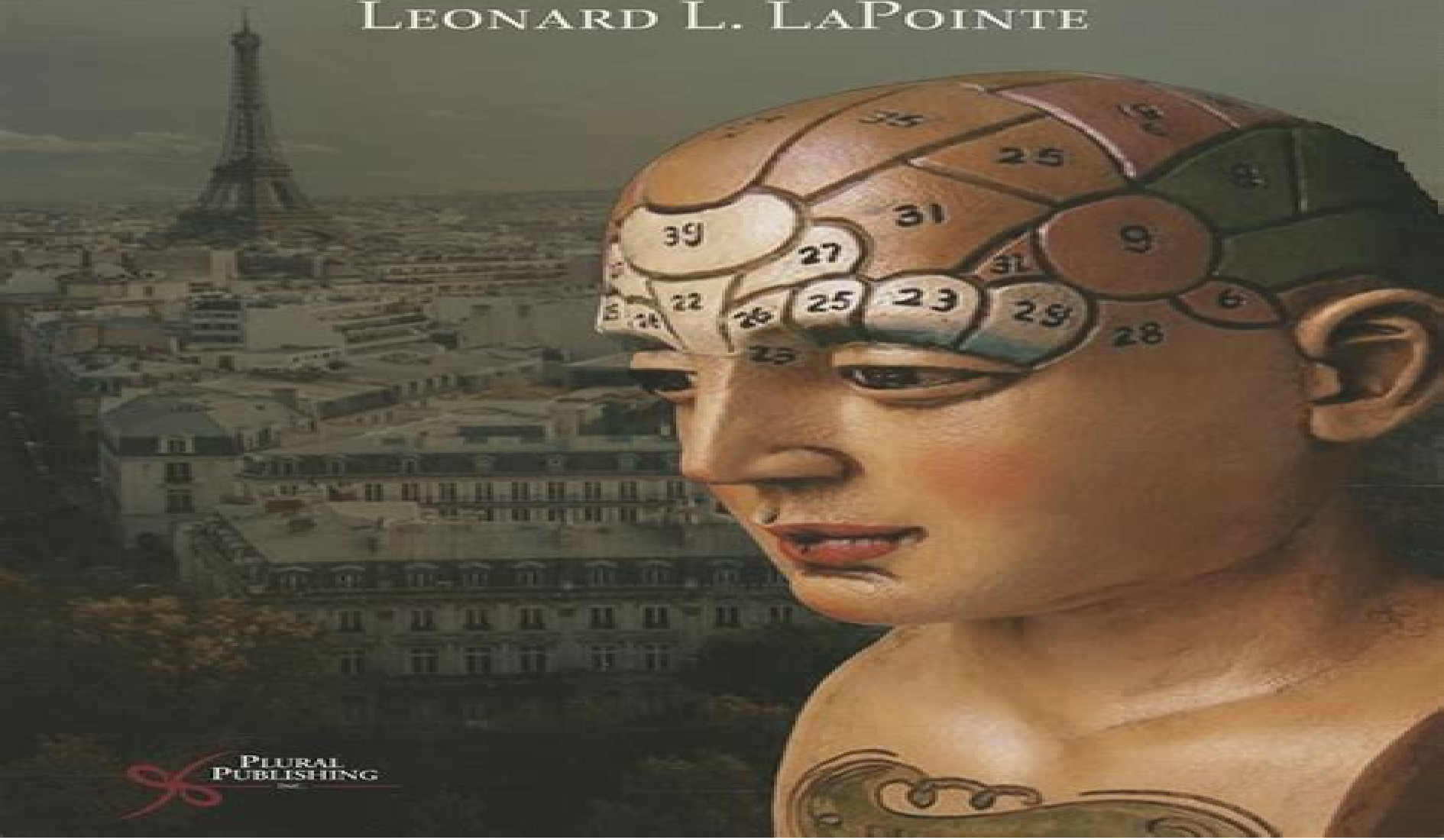

The establishment of language as a focus of study took place over many centuries and reflection on its nature emerged in relation to very different social and cultural practices. Comprised of 29 chapters, it is split into 3 parts each with an introduction covering the larger context of interest in language especially the different philosophical, religious and/or political concerns and socio-cultural practices of the times. At the end of the volume, there is a combined list of all references cited and a comprehensive index of topics, languages, major figures etc. Comprehensive in its scope, it is an essential reference for researchers, teachers and students alike in linguistics and related disciplines.

The first section presents the beginnings of neurology: ancient trepanation, its birth in Mesopotamia, ancient Egypt, the emergence of neurology in the biblical text and the Talmud, neurology in the Greco-Roman world and the period following Galen, neurological conditions in the European Middle Ages and the development of neurology in the 17th and 18th centuries. This section also narrates the history of child neurology.
