McAnally,Susan Rose,Stephen Patrick Quigley,2007 This book was written specifically for professors and college students in teacher training programs for deaf education and for classroom teachers working with deaf and hard of hearing learners It is one of the very few books on the market that focuses entirely on the hearing impaired It consists of three sections each one providing in depth information on topics critical to the teaching of reading to this specific population Section one Foundations contains chapters dealing with theory and research in such topics as cognition reading language literary development vocabulary and comprehension One chapter on ASL English and Reading looks at the research in the area of second language learners and discusses its application to deaf and hard of hearing students Section two Instructional Management deals with instructional management and describes instructional systems and designs These chapters look at current trends in education and how these trends apply to the education of students who are deaf and hard of hearing Section three Applications focuses on specific instructional models in reading writing and spelling detailing strategies that have been successfully used with deaf and hard of hearing learners The last chapter in this section discusses assessment
