Dynamics of Deep Time and Deep Place Laura Doyle, Simon Gikandi, Mwangi wa Githinji, 2025-04-10 Dynamics of Deep Time and Deep Place comprises one volume in an unprecedented three volume set collectively subtitled Decolonial Reconstellations. Together with Volume Two Dissolving Master Narratives and Volume Three Reconceiving Identities in Political Economy it gathers thinkers from across world regions and disciplines who reconfigure critical global thought. Collaboratively conceived the volumes are founded on the observation that we cannot fully uproot the epistemological material violence of coercive systems nor fully re-imagine more ethical visions of planetary community without shared attention to the deeper histories of place and peoples that shape the present. Accordingly the volumes gather social scientists and humanists Indigenous and non Indigenous scholars and intersectional and materialist thinkers who reconceptualize longue durée history and its afterlives. They engage in the dual project to dismantle eurocentric colonial androcentric frameworks and to make visible the legacies of care and creative world making that have sustained human communities. Uncovering pasts that are as complex and dynamic as the present the contributors brilliantly transform notions of temporality, relationality, polity, conjuncture, resistance and experimentation within histories of struggle and alliance. They richly decolonize political imaginaries. The co-editors' introductions articulate fresh frameworks of deep place and deep time freed from eurocentric modernity paradigms indicating pathways toward decolonial collaboration and institutional change. Decolonial Reconstellations offers invaluable resources for researchers and teachers in decolonial postcolonial anti-colonial and Indigenous studies and will also strongly appeal to feminist, anti-racist, Marxist and critical theory scholars across disciplines.

Global Revolutionary Aesthetics and Politics '68 Martin Munro, William J. Cloonan, Barry J. Faulk, Christian P. Weber, 2021-02-22. The year 2018 marked the fiftieth anniversary of May 68, a startlingly now almost mythic event which combined seriousness, courage, humor, and theatrics. The contributions of this volume, based on papers presented at the conference Does la lutte continue? The Global Afterlife of May 68 at Florida State

University in March 2019 explore the ramifications of that springtime protest in the contemporary world. What has widely become known as the movement of 68 consisted in fact of many synchronous movements in different nations that promoted a great variety of political, social and cultural agendas. While it is impossible to write a global history of 68, this volume presents a kaleidoscope of different perceptions, reflections and receptions of protest in France, Italy and other nations that share in common a global utopian imaginary as expressed for example in the slogan All power to the imagination. The contributions of this collection show that while all social struggles are political, many lasting changes in individual mentalities and social structures originated from utopian ideas that were realized first in artistic productions and their aesthetic reception. In this respect, the various protests of May 68 continue.

Francophone Literature After the Postcolonial Age Farid Laroussi, 2024-12-15

Francophone Literature After the Postcolonial Age argues that Francophone literature extends beyond the postcolonial critical landmarks that helped define the field since the late 1980s. Today, Francophone literature maps out different paths that highlight its emancipation from both the Francophonie's cultural ascendancy and postcolonial theory's scholarly hegemony. Farid Laroussi's argument is that three main forces have reshaped the French postcolonial in the twenty-first century: digital globalization, intertextuality, and ecocriticism. With digital globalization, Francophone literature finds new voices unfettered from former aesthetic print and distribution diktats. Home and the exilic paradigm are redefined in the postcolonial subject's own terms. Intertextuality reconnects with poetic dialogism sans the mimicry burden. The intertextuality challenge showcases a new writers' community across time and cultures. The old anxiety around one's own poetic voice now provides valid responses to literary reconfigurations. The book's study cases operate around three specific pairings: Segalen, Glissant, Kafka; Maghreb literature and Morrison, Miano. Lastly, ecocriticism along the decolonial discourse comes to discuss the place of the postcolonial home as well as the responsibility category. The author contends that the attention to the land cannot be separated from imaginaries collective and individual. Francophone writers stand at the crossroads of activism and poetics moving further away from French metropolitan preoccupations.
