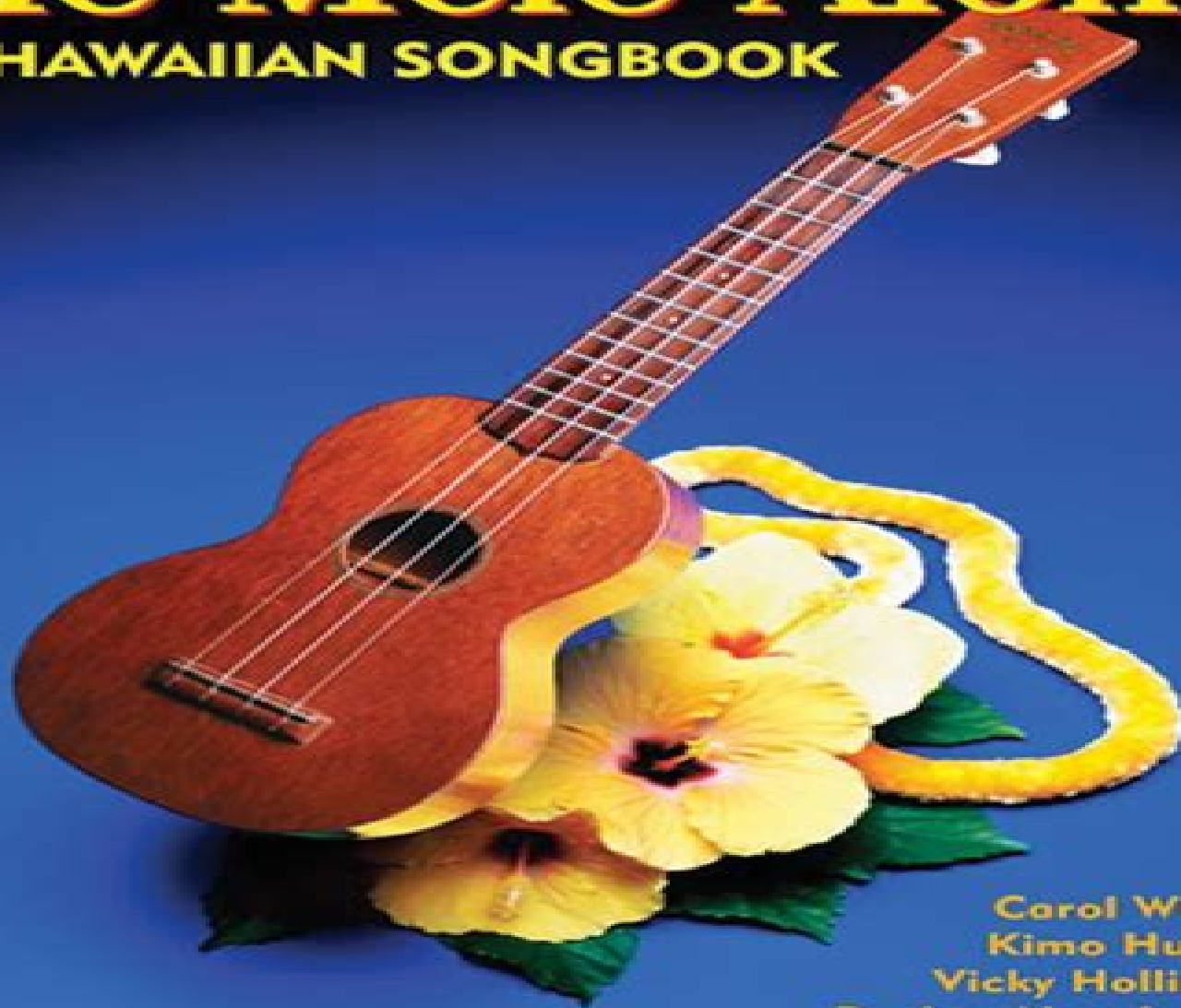

essential companion to her landmark history of the United States These Truths Published on the occasion of the 250th anniversary of the nation's founding the anniversary too of the first state constitutions We the People offers a wholly new history of the Constitution One of the Constitution's founding purposes was to prevent change Lepore writes Another was to allow for change without violence Relying on the extraordinary database she has assembled at the Amendments Project Lepore recounts centuries of attempts mostly by ordinary Americans to realize the promise of the Constitution Yet nearly all those efforts have failed Although nearly twelve thousand amendments have been introduced in Congress since 1789 and thousands more have been proposed outside its doors only twenty seven have ever been ratified More troubling the Constitution has not been meaningfully amended since 1971 Without recourse to amendment she argues the risk of political violence rises So does the risk of constitutional change by presidential or judicial fiat Challenging both the Supreme Court's monopoly on constitutional interpretation and the flawed theory of originalism Lepore contends in this gripping and unfamiliar story of our own past that the philosophy of amendment is foundational to American constitutionalism The framers never intended for the Constitution to be preserved like a butterfly under glass Lepore argues but expected that future generations would be forever tinkering with it hoping to mend America by amending its Constitution through an orderly deliberative and democratic process Lepore's remarkable history seeks too to rekindle a sense of constitutional possibility Congressman Jamie Raskin writes that Lepore has thrown us a lifeline a way of seeing the Constitution neither as an authoritarian straitjacket nor a foolproof magic amulet but as the arena of fierce logical passionate and often deadly struggle for a more perfect union At a time when the Constitution's vulnerability is all too evident and the risk of political violence all too real We the People with its shimmering prose and pioneering research hints at the prospects for a better constitutional future an amended America Songbook John M. Hawaiian Music and Musicians George S. Kanahale,1979 Here after years of preparation is the most ambitious book ever written about Hawaiian music its roots popularity and influences in the world leading personalities and groups organizations songs and publications The complete story is here from ancient chants to the flowering of the musical renaissance in Hawaii nei Nearly 200 illustrations add to the book s appeal for Hawaiian music fans and serious students Many rare photographs of historical interest are among the illustrations featuring singers chanters dancers and instrumentalists Musical instruments are also featured in drawings and photographs Melody lines chants and rhythm patterns are illustrated by music notation The book is organized like an encyclopedia with about 200 entries in alphabetical order They include biographies of musicians from every period of Hawaiian musical history from Henry Berger David Kalakaua Queen Lili uokalani and others of her time to the great names of the first half of the twentieth century and on to the performers and composers of today s Hawaiian renaissance There are major articles on chant slack key steel guitar ukulele hīmeni Hawaiian orchestras falsetto humor in Hawaiian music radio television and the recording industry to name a few Definitive essays tell the story of all ancient and modern musical instruments and the most loved and important songs of the last 150 years Much of the material is new or original and fresh insights are brought to the more familiar topics Some myths are dispelled long standing controversies discussed if not settled For instance the book comes closer to answering the question what is Hawaiian music than anything written so far The work also contains and extensive annotated bibliography of works on Hawaiian music and two discographies *A New Literary History of America* Greil Marcus,Werner Sollors,2012-05-07 America is a nation making itself up as it goes along a story of discovery and invention unfolding in speeches and images letters and poetry unprecedented feats of scholarship and imagination In these myriad multiform endlessly changing expressions of the American experience the authors and editors of this volume find a new American history In more than two hundred original essays A New Literary History of America brings together the nation s many voices From the first conception of a New World
