The report included estimated percentages of students expected to perform at each of the four performance levels reported by grade and test subject e g English Language Arts or Mathematics based on preliminary field testing of the Smarter Balanced assessment conducted during the spring of 2014. These threshold scale scores and expected percentages represent a preliminary attempt at standard setting and Smarter Balanced may revise them after the spring 2015 testing term. Nevertheless they represent the best information currently available about the cut scores that will be used during the spring 2015 testing term of the Smarter Balanced test. Using the information provided within the Smarter Balanced report about the percentages of students expected to perform at each level Northwest Evaluation Association NWEA conducted a series of analyses to examine what Measures of Academic Progress MAP interim assessment scores might be associated with these performance level categories. This was not an
