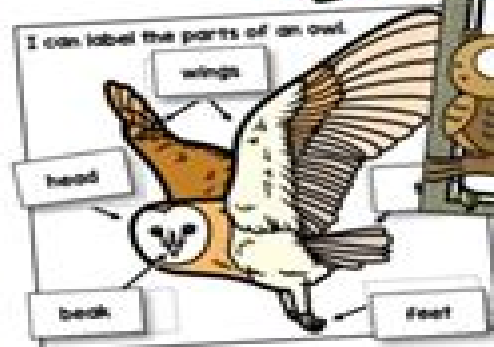

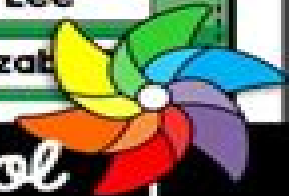
Owl Pokey
