## PAIR WORK

This strategy involves two students collaborating and supporting each other, enhancing peer-to-peer interaction and idea sharing.

## PLAY GAMES

Integrating games into lessons makes learning enjoyable and dynamic, stimulating both competition and cooperation.

## STUDENTS CO-EVALUATE

Peer review allows students to evaluate each other's work, offering diverse perspectives and fostering collaboration.

## AROUSING CURIOSITY

Initiating activities by sparking students' interest engages them and makes learning intriguing.

## SIGNPOSTING

Clearly stating lesson objectives or summarizing progress guides students in understanding the lesson's purpose.

## GIVING STUDENTS CHOICES

Giving students choices in their learning process fosters independence and personal engagement.

## PERSONALIZATION

Allowing students to express personal meanings in their work makes learning more relevant and engaging.

## INDIVIDUAL COMPETITION

Incorporating elements of individual competition in activities motivates students to improve performance.

## EFFECTIVE PRAISE

Specific and sincere praise aligned with student achievement boosts confidence and reinforces positive behavior.

## GROUP WORK

Small teams of students work together, fostering a sense of community and developing teamwork skills.

## STUDENTS SELF-EVALUATE

Students assess their own learning, promoting reflection, self-awareness, and responsibility.

## SCAFFOLDING

Teachers provide temporary support to students, adapting to their level of understanding until they can perform tasks independently.

## ESTABLISHING RELEVANCE

Linking lessons to students' everyday lives helps them understand the practical application of knowledge.

## SOCIAL CHAT

Informal conversations unrelated to the lesson build rapport and create a relaxed classroom environment.

## TANGIBLE REWARD

Providing physical rewards for participation or success serves as a direct motivator, especially for younger students.

## TANGIBLE TASK PRODUCT

Creating a physical product as part of learning enhances engagement and gives a sense of accomplishment.

## TEAM COMPETITION

Team-based competitive activities encourage teamwork and collaborative skills while maintaining a competitive spirit.

## CLASS APPLAUSE

Celebrating students' efforts or achievements with applause fosters a supportive and positive classroom atmosphere.
