The study revised and expanded explores standard works by such composers as Beethoven, Schubert, Rossini, Bellini, Schumann, Mendelssohn, Liszt, Berlioz, Wagner, Verdi, Bizet, Brahms, Strauss, Franck, Mussorgsky, Tchaikovsky, Dvořák, Sibelius, Mahler, and Puccini, tracing the various artistic threads woven through Western music between 1800 and 1900. Frequent and detailed tables serve readers as guides to examination of musical scores from this period or as roadmaps to listening, and the text provides relevant biographical and cultural background of the composers whose work we most often enjoy today. In this new edition featuring more composers and re-examining their cultural milieu, music students will find a succinct and accessible introduction to a central period in Western classical music, while other musically literate readers may enjoy its concise summary of the nineteenth century's musical culture. *Nineteenth-century Music* Jon W. **Symphony no. 2 in D Minor, op. 24 ("Jullien")** George Frederick Bristow, 2011-01-01 URL <https://www.areditions.com/rrrra/a072.html> George Frederick Bristow 1825-98 American composer conductor teacher and performer was a pillar of the New York musical community for the second half of the nineteenth century His participation in an important mid century battle of words between William Henry Fry and the journalist Richard Storrs Willis and concerning a lack of support for American composers by the Philharmonic Society has unfortunately overshadowed his accomplishments as a composer which were significant Bristow is remembered today primarily for his opera Rip van Winkle 1855 and oratorio Daniel 1866 but he was also a skillful and productive composer of orchestral music one of only a handful of American orchestral composers active at mid century Bristow wrote his Symphony no 2 Jullien in 1853 It is a substantial work in four movements scored for the standard orchestra of the early nineteenth century and strongly influenced by the personal styles of Beethoven and Mendelssohn whose works were performed regularly by the Philharmonic Society The symphony is skillfully crafted melodious and an intrinsically worthy work of musical artistry It was named to honor the French conductor Louis Jullien who visited the United States in 1853-54 with an unparalleled orchestra While in the United States Jullien both commissioned and performed American works including this symphony his support served as the catalyst for the Fry Willis battle The introductory essay to this symphony examines Bristow's career the composition of orchestral music in America at mid century and Jullien's role in the musical battle the edition makes available for the first time an important work that has been undeservedly forgotten for over 150 years
