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web pogil solubility why solubility is a measure of the amount of solute that will dissolve in a given amount of solvent usually

water at a given temperature a solubility curve shows how much solute dissolves in a given volume of solvent at a given temperature

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web information solubility rules a solute is considered soluble if an appreciable amount of it can be dissolved in a given amount of the solvent for example both table salt  $\text{NaCl}$  and table sugar  $\text{C}_{12}\text{H}_{22}\text{O}_{11}$  are soluble substances in water a solute is considered insoluble if very little of it dissolves in a given amount of the solvent
